Lots across border road from the majority of the density of this project are zoned 1 house on 5-10 acres. While it may appear on the surface that Mr. Neal is reducing the density of the development as compared to what is potentially allowed the reality is that potential density would not be possible considering the landscape and he is maximizing density with no consideration for wildlife, the surrounding area density or buffer zones and is incompatible with zoning directly across the street. See attached proposed development VICA. The proposed development increases density 50-100x that directly across the street and this lacks any transition in density as required by city codes. Details such as how you appropriately work the transition from higher-density housing to the low-density housing in the area. Details like how you take care to protect special parks and preserves so that they do not become totally isolated "zoos" bounded by high-density development on all sides.

Yes, you want to attract quality builders to the area, and Neal appears to be the right kind of builder. But please, please, please make sure YOU are the ones that call the shots on the details. Pat Neal wants to build homes. YOU are charged with shaping the community, taking into account all that is special about the Venice area, taking into account the interests of all of the citizens of the community, including a good number of citizens who chose to invest in homes on larger lots in the more rural areas of the community.

Growth is coming, no question about it, and it allows people like me to have the opportunity to move to Venice. But I didn't choose to move to Venice because it has HOUSES. I chose to move to Venice because it is a special COMMUNITY, and with care, can remain a special COMMUNITY.

You are being asked to approve the plans of a builder before the required planning by the city has even been done. You have not accounted for wildlife corridors. You have not adequately planned smooth transitions from very low density housing to the high density housing being proposed. You have no survey before you of the wildlife in the area and the advice of experts on how high density housing will impact that wildlife.

I'm sure there are some who have absolutely no idea what a "wildlife corridor" is and probably laugh all of this off as something some "tree hugger" came up with. Well, fact is there are many who chose to move to the city of Venice because it DOES -- currently -- have nature preserves with meaningful populations of birds and prey; it DOES -- currently -- have areas of much lower density housing that allow for the movement of wildlife and the attraction of birds; it DOES -currently -- have some semblance of balance between high density housing and low density housing and it currently appears to be a special community, a unique community that does not just allow sprawl, sprawl and more sprawl.

Dear Mayor Holic and City Council Members,

Ten years ago my husband and I visited friends in Venice. We had a wonderful time and visited again the next year. We were so taken with the small town and rural feeling of the greater Venice area, we decided to spend the following year here to see if it was the right place for us to relocate. Having eliminated the East coast of Florida because of all the congestion, we traveled up and down the West coast from Tampa to Sarasota and Port Charlotte to Fort Meyers. We were very saddened to see that other cities on the gulf had set high density development as their priority, ignoring the long term negative impact it would have on their communities. Although some areas were nicely done with setbacks and attractive landscaping, it was just miles of one densely built neighborhood after another. We chose Venice to be our new home BECAUSE of its small town feeling

and rural nature. It wasn't like every other city. Although there were large areas of high density development, there were huge areas of farm land in which homes were built on multi acred lots. We chose to live in Venice because of the natural beauty of the outlying areas. We frequently take advantage of the peaceful low traffic drive to the many preserve areas east of Venice. This is inconsistent with the vision of the original city planners who intended to provide a sustainable, compatible community.

2. The city agreed to establish a wildlife corridor by 2013, and this property is a natural wildlife corridor which connects without crossing any major streets to existing preserves and the Carlton Reserve, the largest open space reserve in Sarasota County. Approving the VICA plan without concern for the wildlife corridor is potentially a "taking" from the wildlife corridor.

3. The VICA plan is incomplete, lacking details of height and placement of homes and easements. No incomplete plan should be accepted. The neighbors have a right to know exactly what will be built in this area. Neal Communities is proposing yet another PUD which is inconsistent with modern thinking of developments to provide walkable, user-friendly communities.

4. Border Road is a naturally established Gateway to the Preserves and should not be impacted by a large density of homes. This density is not good for the current or future residents of the City of Venice, nor of the rural neighbors. A gradual change in density from the Waterford estates to the low density at the Myakka River would make more sense.

5. The impact to traffic from Jacaranda westward would be increased grid-lock -- imagine the additional thousands of people from the Jacaranda/Border/Laurel area all driving to historic downtown and our once lovely beaches. Existing infrastructure is barely sufficient for the current seasonal traffic to which the area is subjected.
