 - LWVFL, Voices for Health, Health Justice Project, Florida Policy Institute, etc.

Educate and engage community members

Correct misinformation

Submit bills in Senate and House

Eligibility for Florida Medicaid is Limited

- Only low income who are in certain groups
 - Children up to 18 years
 - Pregnant women
 - Seniors
 - Disabled
- Very few other adults 19-64
- Medicare must be 65 years old

MedEx - Uninsured-Low Income Adults

- Age 19-64 with income < 138 % of Poverty
 - <\$30,000 family = 3

- Florida Pre-Pandemic
 - Almost 900,000

Who Are the Uninsured?

- Self-employed
- Small business owners and employees
- Hourly workers in hospitality, construction etc.
- Caretakers of children and disabled family members
- Unable to work due to health issues

We Pay for Health Care We Don't Get!

 In 2011 our federal taxes were raised to pay for expanding Medicaid to adults

The legislature has failed to act on this opportunity

 Our money is paying for people in other states to get health care!

Medicaid Expansion – Health Benefits

- Better control of chronic conditions
- Less use of ER and hospital care
- Early treatment for disease like cancer
- Fewer deaths
 - Maternal and newborns
 - Among 55-64 year old
- Behavioral Health
 - Mental Health and addiction services
- Reduces Disparities

Financial Benefits to Enrollees

- Eliminates burden of medical debt
- Fewer bills going to collections
- Can afford food, clothing, pay rent and utilities
- Better credit
 - Lower interest rates
- Able to
 - Look for and maintain steady work
 - Look for a better job

Community Benefits

- Insured people will spend money in the local economy
- Promotes entrepreneurship
 - Levels the playing field for small business
 - Protects against "job lock"
- Higher rates of employment among low-income adults in states that expanded Medicaid
- Hospitals have less uncompensated care care
 - Less likely to close
- Counties save tax dollars spent on indigent health care

Sarasota County

- ~11,000 uninsured who would be eligible (2019)
- 9,266 fewer employed in Nov 2020 than last year
- 19.5% of employed adults 19-64 had no health insurance (pre-pandemic)
- 36% go to ER or urgent care center when they need health care or are sick

Hospital

- Sarasota Memorial Hospital (2017)
 - Safety net care cost \$101,062,863
 - \$50 million from ad valorem taxes

- Doctors Hospital Sarasota (2019)
 - \$237,095,027 cost of charity and uncompensated care

Sarasota County – Health Needs Assessment

Top strategic issue - mental health

- Residents report depression, alcohol and drug abuse
- Death rate from liver disease increased by 50% since 2013
- Suicide rate is higher than the State since 2009
- Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome (15/1000 births state 6.2)

Racial Disparities – Maternal and Child health

 "Clear disparities in infant death which have persisted over time and are significantly worse than the state"

 "Black mothers less likely than white mothers to enter prenatal care in first trimester"

 Black mothers are 4.1 times more likely to have a baby which weights 3.3 pounds

Cost of Expansion to State

- States pay for a portion of Medicaid costs
 - Regular Medicaid match = 40%
 - Medicaid expansion math = 10%

- MedEx will decrease need for state general revenue
 - Some current enrollees eligible for lower match
 - State support for indigent care eliminated
 - Provider taxes increase

Cost of Expansion to State

- State matching funds
 - Reduced by ~\$200 million
- Stimulus of 4.1 -4.29 billion federal dollars per year
 - Added to state budget for health care
 - 1.5-1.7 multiplier increase of \$6-7.27 billion in economic activity in Florida

Other States

"Medicaid expansion has a substantial effect on Montana's economy.
......expansion introducednew spending to Montana's economy
each year. This spending ripples through Montana's economy,
generating approximately 5,000 jobs and \$270 million in personal
income in each yearMedicaid expansion appears to improve
outcomes for Montanans—reducing crime, improving health, and
lowering debt. ...the costs to the state budget are more than offset by
the savings created by Medicaid expansion and by the revenues
associated with increased economic activity."

Summary

- Enrollees
 - Improved financial status
 - Able to work
 - Money to spend on food, housing, etc.
- Healthier Communities
 - Reduce county expenditures
 - Reduces uncompensated care at hospitals
 - Supports small business and increased employment
- State
 - Reduces state funds for match
 - Federal stimulus
